This vehicle is for off-road use only. It is mainly for general recreational use but it may also be used for utility purposes.

Failure to follow the warnings contained in this Operator's Guide can result in SERIOUS INJURY or DEATH.

Age Recommendation

These vehicles are a category Y (Youth model), always follow these age recommendations:

- The Renegade 70 vehicle is a category Y-6+ and should be used by children age 6 or older under adult supervision, or operator age 16 or older.
- The Renegade 110 and Renegade 110 Xxc vehicles are a category Y-10+ and should be used by children age 10 or older under adult supervision, or operator age 16 or older.
- Also, never allow continued use of an ATV by a child if the child does not have the abilities to operate it safely, regardless of age.

Training Course

Never operate this vehicle without proper instruction. **Take a training course**. All operators should receive training from a certified instructor.

For more information about ATV safety, contact an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer to find out about available training courses nearest you.

GENERAL PRECAUTIONS

Avoid Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

All engine exhaust contains carbon monoxide, a deadly gas. Breathing carbon monoxide can cause headaches, dizziness, drowsiness, nausea, confusion and eventually death.

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas that may be present even if you do not see or smell any engine exhaust. Deadly levels of carbon monoxide can collect rapidly, and you can quickly be overcome and unable to save yourself. Also, deadly levels of carbon monoxide can linger for hours or days in enclosed or poorly ventilated areas. If you experience any symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning, leave the area immediately, get fresh air and seek medical treatment

To prevent serious injury or death from carbon monoxide:

- Never run the vehicle in poorly ventilated or partially enclosed areas such as garages, carports or barns. Even if you try to ventilate engine exhaust with fans or open windows and doors, carbon monoxide can rapidly reach dangerous levels.
- Never run the vehicle outdoors where engine exhaust can be drawn into a building through openings such as windows and doors.

Avoid Gasoline Fires and Other Hazards

Gasoline is extremely flammable and highly explosive. Fuel vapors can spread and be ignited by a spark or flame many feet away from the engine. To reduce the risk of fire or explosion, follow these instructions:

- Use only an approved red gasoline container to store fuel.
- Never fill a gasoline container on the vehicle. An electrical static discharge may ignite the fuel.
- For refueling, strictly adhere to instructions in Fuel.
- Never start or operate the engine if the fuel cap is not properly installed.

Gasoline is poisonous and can cause injury or death.

- Never siphon gasoline by mouth.
- If you swallow gasoline, get any in your eye(s), or inhale gasoline vapor, see your doctor immediately.

If gasoline spills on you, wash with soap and water and change your clothes.

Avoid Burns from Hot Parts

Certain components like brake rotors and exhaust components become hot during operation. Avoid contact with those parts during and shortly after operation to avoid burn wounds.

Accessories and Modifications

Any modifications or addition of accessories approved by BRP may affect the handling of your vehicle. It is important to take the time to get familiar with the vehicle once modifications are made to understand how to adapt your driving behavior accordingly.

Avoid installing equipment not specifically approved by BRP for the vehicle and avoid unauthorized modifications. These modifications and equipment have not been tested by BRP and may create hazards. For example, they could:

- Create a loss of control and increase risk of crash.
- Cause overheating or short circuits increasing the risk of fire or burn injuries.
- Affect the protection features provided by the vehicle.
- Affect the behavior of the trailer when the vehicle is transported.
- Cause a risk of losing objects on the road when transported.

Your vehicle may also become illegal to ride.

See your authorized BRP Off-road dealer for available BRP accessories for your vehicle.

For safety reasons, some BRP accessories must be installed by a BRP dealer but if you decide to install the accessory by yourself, when not required to be done by the dealer, it is important to follow all the instructions carefully and, if applicable, understand all the information on how to use the product or for servicing.

If the accessory has been installed on your vehicle by another person than you, BRP strongly recommends you to read the corresponding instruction sheet as there may be more for information on how to use it safely or for the servicing.

SPECIAL SAFETY MESSAGES

THIS VEHICLE IS NOT A TOY AND CAN BE HAZARDOUS TO OPERATE.

 This vehicle handles differently from other vehicles. A collision or rollover can occur quickly if you fail to take proper precautions, even during routine maneuvers such as turning and driving on hills or over obstacles.

SEVERE INJURY OR DEATH can result if you do not follow these instructions:

- Read this Operator's Guide and all on-product safety labels carefully and follow the operating procedures described. Watch and pay attention to the safety video before operating the vehicle.
- Always follow this age recommendation: Renegade 70 vehicle should be used by children age 6 or older under adult supervision, or by an operator age 16 or older.
- Always follow this age recommendation: Renegade 110 and Renegade 110 Xxc vehicles should be used by children age 10 or older under adult supervision, or by an operator age 16 or older.
- Also, never allow continued use of an ATV by a child if he does not have the abilities to operate it safely, regardless of age.
- Never carry a passenger on this vehicle. Passenger(s) affect balance and steering and increase risk of losing control.
- Never operate this vehicle on any paved surfaces, including sidewalks, driveways, parking lots and streets.
- Never operate this vehicle on any public street, road or highway, even a dirt or gravel one.
- Never take place on this vehicle without wearing an approved helmet that fits properly. You should also wear eye protection (goggles or visor), gloves, boots, long sleeved shirt or jacket, and long pants.
- Never use this vehicle if you are tired, ill, or with drugs or alcohol.
 Your reaction time and judgement is greatly affected under these conditions.
- Never operate at excessive speeds. Always go at a speed that is proper for the terrain, visibility, and operating conditions, and your experience.
- Never attempt wheelies, jumps, or other stunts.
- Always inspect your vehicle prior to each time you use it to make sure it is in a safe operating condition. Always follow the inspection and maintenance procedures and schedules described in this Operator's Guide.
- Always keep both hands on the handlebars and both feet on the footpegs of the vehicle during operation.
- Always go slowly and be extra careful when operating on unfamiliar terrain. Always be alert to changing terrain conditions when operating this vehicle.
- Never operate on excessively rough, slippery, or loose terrain until you have learned and practiced the skills necessary to control this vehicle on such terrain. Always be especially cautious on these kinds of terrain.

- Always follow proper procedures for turning as described further in this Operator's Guide. Practice turning at low speeds before attempting to turn at faster speeds. Do not turn at excessive speed.
- Never operate this vehicle on hills too steep for the vehicle or for your abilities. Practice on smaller hills before attempting larger hills.
- Always follow proper procedures for climbing hills as described further in this Operator's Guide. Check the terrain carefully before you start up any hill. Never climb hills with excessively slippery or loose surfaces. Shift your weight forward. Never open the throttle suddenly or make sudden gear changes. Never go over the top of any hill at high speed.
- Always follow proper procedures for going down hills and for braking on hills as described further in this Operator's Guide. Check the terrain carefully before you start down any hill. Shift your weight backward. Never go down a hill at high speed. Avoid going down a hill at an angle that would cause the vehicle to lean sharply to one side. Go straight down the hill where possible.
- Always follow proper procedures for crossing the side of a hill as
 described further in this Operator's Guide. Avoid hills with excessively slippery or loose surfaces. Shift your weight to the uphill side
 of the vehicle. Never attempt to turn the vehicle around on any hill
 until you have mastered the turning technique described in this Operator's Guide on level ground. Avoid crossing the side of a steep
 hill if possible.
- Always use proper procedures if you stall or roll backwards when climbing a hill. To avoid stalling, use proper gear and maintain a steady speed when climbing a hill. If you stall or roll backwards, follow the special procedure for braking described in this Operator's Guide. Dismount on the uphill side or to a side if pointed straight uphill. Turn the vehicle around and remount, following the procedure described further in this Operator's Guide.
- Always check for obstacles before operating in a new area. Never attempt to operate over large obstacles, such as large rocks or fallen trees. Always follow proper procedures when operating over obstacles as described further in this Operator's Guide.
- Always be careful when skidding or sliding. Learn to safely control skidding or sliding by practicing at low speeds and on level smooth terrain. On extremely slippery surfaces, such as ice, go slowly and be very cautious in order to reduce the chance of skidding out of control.
- Never operate this vehicle in fast flowing water or in water deeper than that specified in this Operator's Guide. Remember that wet brakes may have reduced stopping ability. Test your brakes after leaving water, mud or snow. If necessary, apply them several times to let friction dry out the pads.
- Always keep in mind that braking distance is readily affected by but not limited to; weather and terrain conditions, braking system and

- tire conditions, vehicle speed and attitude. Remember to adjust your driving accordingly.
- BRP recommends sitting on your ATV when operating in reverse. Avoid standing up. Your weight could shift forward against the throttle lever causing an unexpected acceleration and loss of control.
- Always use the size and type tires specified further in this Operator's Guide. Always maintain proper tire pressure as described further in this Operator's Guide.
- Never load a youth model vehicle.
- Never operate this vehicle without proper instruction. Take a training course. All operators should receive training from a certified instructor.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Never ride this vehicle on a frozen surface before you are sure the ice is thick enough and sound enough to support the vehicle and its load, as well as the force that is created by a moving vehicle.

Proper Position on the Vehicle

A WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Removing hands from handlebars or feet from the footrests during operation.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Removing even one hand or foot can reduce your ability to control the vehicle or could cause you to lose your balance and fall off the vehicle. If you remove a foot from the footrests, your foot or leg may come into contact with the rear wheels, which could injure you or cause an accident.

HÓW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Operator must always keep both hands on the handlebars and both feet on the footrests during vehicle operation.

Unfamiliar Terrain

⚠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Failure to use extra care when operating this vehicle on unfamiliar terrain.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

You can come upon hidden rocks, bumps, or holes, without enough time to react.

Could result in the vehicle overturning or loss of control.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Go slowly and be extra careful when operating on unfamiliar terrain.

Always be alert to changing terrain conditions when operating the vehicle.

Operating on Excessively Rough, Slippery or Loose Terrain

WARNING

POTENTIAL HAZARD

Failure to use extra care when operating on excessively rough, slippery or loose terrain.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Could cause loss of traction or vehicle control, which could result in an accident, including an overturn.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Do not operate on excessively rough, slippery or loose terrain until you have learned and practiced the skills necessary to control this vehicle on such terrain.

Always be especially cautious on these kinds of terrain.

Turning Improperly

⚠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Turning improperly. WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Vehicle could go out of control, causing a collision or an overturn.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Always follow proper procedures for turning as described in this Operator's Guide. Practice turning at low speeds before attempting to turn at faster speeds.

Do not turn at excessive speed.

Excessively Steep Hills

A WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Operating on excessively steep hills.

WHAT CĂN HAPPEN

The vehicle can overturn more easily on extremely steep hills than on level surfaces or small hills.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Never operate this vehicle on hills too steep for the vehicle or for your abilities.

Practice on smaller hills before attempting larger hills.

Climbing Hills

⚠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD Climbing hills improperly.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Could cause loss of control or cause vehicle to overturn. HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Always follow proper procedures for climbing hills as described in this Operator's Guide.

Always check the terrain carefully before you start up any hill. Never climb hills with excessively slippery or loose surfaces. Shift your weight forward.

Never open the throttle suddenly or make sudden gear changes. The vehicle could flip over backwards.

Never go over the top of any hill at high speed. An obstacle, a sharp drop, or another vehicle or person could be on the other side of the hill.

Down a Hill

⚠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Going down a hill improperly.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Could cause loss of control or cause vehicle to overturn.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Always follow proper procedures for going down hills as described in this Operator's Guide.

NOTE:

A special technique is required when braking as you go down a hill.

Always check the terrain carefully before you start down any hill

Shift your weight backward.

Never go down a hill at high speed.

Avoid going down a hill at an angle which would cause the vehicle to lean sharply to one side. Go straight down the hill where possible.

Crossing or Turning on Hills

⚠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Improperly crossing hills or turning on hills.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Could cause loss of control or cause vehicle to overturn.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Never attempt to turn the vehicle around on any hill until you have mastered the turning technique as described in this Operator's Guide on level ground. Be very careful when turning on any hill.

Avoid crossing the side of a steep hill if possible.

When crossing the side of a hill:

Always follow proper procedures as described further in this Operator's Guide.

Avoid hills with excessively slippery or loose surfaces.

Operator must shift weight to the uphill side of the vehicle.

Stalling, Rolling Backwards or Dismounting While Climbing a Hill

A WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Stalling, rolling backwards or improperly dismounting while climbing a hill.

WHAT ČAN HAPPEN

Could result in vehicle overturning.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Use low gear and maintain steady speed when climbing a hill. If you lose all forward speed:

Operator must keep their weight uphill. Never open the throttle suddenly or make sudden gear changes. The vehicle could flip over backwards.

Apply the brakes.

Lock parking brake after you have stopped.

Disembark on uphill side, or to a side if pointed straight uphill.

If you begin rolling backwards:

Operator must keep their weight uphill. Never open the throttle suddenly or make sudden gear changes. The vehicle could flip over backwards.

Never apply the rear brake while rolling backwards.

Apply the front brake gradually.

When fully stopped, apply rear brake as well and lock parking brake.

Disembark on uphill side, or to a side if pointed straight uphill. Turn the vehicle around and remount, following the procedure described further in this Operator's Guide.

Operating Over Obstacles

A WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Improperly operating over obstacles.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Could cause loss of control or a collision.

Could cause the vehicle to overturn.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Before operating in a new area, check for obstacles.

Never attempt to ride over large obstacles, such as large rocks or fallen trees.

When you go over obstacles, always follow proper procedures as described in this Operator's Guide.

Skidding or Sliding

⚠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Skidding or sliding improperly.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

You may lose control of this vehicle.

You may also regain traction unexpectedly, which may cause the vehicle to overturn.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Learn to safely control skidding or sliding by practicing at low speeds and on level smooth terrain.

On extremely slippery surfaces, such as ice, go slowly and be very cautious in order to reduce the chance of skidding or sliding out of control.

Deep or Fast Flowing Water



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Operating this vehicle through deep or fast flowing water. WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Tires may float, causing loss of traction and loss of control, which could lead to an accident.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Never operate this vehicle in fast flowing water or in deep water.

Check water depth and current before you attempt to cross any water. Water should not go above the center of the wheels. Remember that wet brakes may have reduced stopping ability. Test your brakes after leaving water. If necessary, apply them several times to let friction dry out the pads.

Operating in Reverse

♠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Improperly operating in reverse. WHAT CAN HAPPEN

You could hit an obstacle or person behind the vehicle, resulting in serious injury.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

When you select reverse gear, make sure there are no obstacles or people behind the vehicle. When it is safe to proceed, go slowly.

Tire Pressure

⚠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Operating this vehicle with improper tires, or with improper or uneven tire pressure.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Use of improper tires on this vehicle, or operation of this vehicle with improper or uneven tire pressure, may cause loss of control, tire blow outs, tire to move around on its rim, and increases the risk of an accident.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Always use the size and type of tires specified in this Operator's Guide for this vehicle.

Always maintain proper tire pressure as described in this Operator's Guide.

Always replace wheels or tires that are damaged.

Improper Modifications

♠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Operating this vehicle with improper modifications.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Improper installation of accessories or modification of this vehicle may cause changes in handling which in some situations could lead to an accident.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Never modify this vehicle through improper installation or use of accessories. All parts and accessories added to this vehicle should be approved by BRP and should be installed and used according to instructions. If you have questions, consult an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer.

NEVER install a passenger seat or use the racks to carry a passenger.

Modification of the vehicle to increase speed and performance may violate the terms and conditions of your vehicle limited warranty. In addition, certain modifications including the removal of engine or exhaust components are illegal under most laws.

Loading, Carrying or Towing Cargo

⚠ WARNING



POTENTIAL HAZARD

Overloading this vehicle, carrying or towing cargo improperly. WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Could cause changes in vehicle handling which could lead to an accident.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Never load cargo on this vehicle.

Never tow cargo or another vehicle with this vehicle.

Transporting Flammable or Dangerous Material

♠ WARNING

POTENTIAL HAZARD

Transporting flammable or dangerous material can lead to explosions.

WHAT CAN HAPPEN

This can cause serious injury or death.

HOW TO AVOID THE HAZARD

Never transport flammable or dangerous material.

PRE-RIDE INSPECTION

A WARNING

Perform a pre-ride inspection before each ride to detect any potential problem that could occur during operation. The pre-ride inspection can help you monitor wear and deterioration before they become a problem. Correct any problem that you discover to reduce the risk of a breakdown or crash.

Before using this vehicle, the operator and/or an adult should always perform the following pre-ride inspection check list.

RIDING THE VEHICLE

To fully appreciate the pleasures and excitement of riding this vehicle, there are some basic rules and tips that you MUST follow. Some may be new to you while others may be common sense or obvious.

Please take the time to study this Operator's Guide and all on-product safety labels as well as the safety video mentioned in *General Information*. They more completely describe what you should know about this vehicle before riding it.

For the child's safety, we strongly recommend you also follow and enforce this recommendation. You are the sole judge of a rider's capability to understand the risks and operate a vehicle safely.

Individuals with cognitive or physical impairments or who are high risk takers have an increased exposure to overturns or collisions which may result in injury including death.

Not all vehicles are the same. Each has its own unique performance characteristics, controls and features. Each will ride and handle differently.

Become completely familiar with the operational controls and the general operation of the vehicle before venturing into off road conditions. Practice driving in a suitable area free of hazards and feel the response of each control. Drive at low speeds. Higher speeds require greater experience, knowledge and suitable riding conditions.

Riding conditions vary from place to place. Each is subject to weather conditions which may radically change from time to time and from season to season.

Riding on sand is different than riding on snow or through forests or marshes. Each location may require a greater degree of awareness and skills. Show good judgement. Always proceed with caution. Please do not take any unnecessary risks that could leave you stranded or possibly injured.

Never assume that the vehicle will go everywhere safely. Sudden changes in terrain caused by holes, depressions, banks, softer or harder "ground" or other irregularities may cause the vehicle to topple or become unstable. To avoid this, slow down and always observe the terrain ahead. If the vehicle does begin to topple or tip over, the best advice is to immediately get off... AWAY from the direction of the tip over!

We encourage you to have an Annual Safety Inspection of your vehicle. Please contact an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer for further details. Though not required, it is recommended that an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer performs the preseason preparation of your vehicle. Each visit to your authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer is a great opportunity for your dealer to verify if your vehicle is included in any safety campaign. We also urge you to visit your authorized

RIDING THE VEHICLE

Can-Am Off-road dealer in a timely manner if you become aware of any safety related campaigns.

See an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer for available accessories you may require.

Riding Gear

Actual weather conditions should help you decide how to dress. Dress for the coldest weather expected. Thermal underwear next to the skin also provides a good insulation. It is important that the operator always wears the appropriate protective riding gear and apparel, including an approved helmet, eye protection, boots, gloves, a long sleeved shirt and pants. This type of clothing will provide you protection from some of the minor hazards you may encounter en route. The operator must never wear loose clothing such as a scarf that may get entangled in the vehicle or on tree branches and shrubs. Depending on conditions, anti-fogging goggles or sunglasses may be required. Different colored lenses available for goggles or sunglasses help you distinguish terrain variations. Sunglasses should only be worn during the daytime.



Carrying a Passenger is Prohibited

This vehicle is designed specifically to carry an operator only. Even with a long seat, this vehicle is not designed nor intended to carry passenger (s). NEVER install passenger seat or use the cargo area to carry passenger(s). Carrying passenger(s) may affect the stability and your control of the vehicle.

Carrying Loads

Never load cargo on this vehicle.

Recreational Riding

Respect the rights and limitations of others. Stay away from areas designated for other types of off road use. This includes snowmobile trails, equestrian trails, cross country ski trails, mountain bike trails, etc. Never assume there are no other users on the trail. Always stay to the complete right of the trail and do not zigzag to one side of the trail then the other. Be prepared to stop or pull off to the side if another trail user appears in front of you.

Join a local ATV club. It will provide you with a map and advice or inform you where you can ride. If a club does not exist in your area, help to start one. Group riding and club activities provide a pleasurable, social experience.

Always keep a safe distance from other riders. Your judgment of speed, terrain conditions, weather, mechanical condition of your vehicle and the "trust in judgment" you have in others around you will help you make a better choice of appropriate safe distance. This vehicle, like any other motorized vehicle, cannot stop "on a dime". Allow greater distance for braking.

Before you ride, tell someone where you are planning to travel and your expected time of return.

Depending on the length of your ride, carry additional tools, drinking water, food and emergency equipment. Find out where you can get additional gasoline and oil. Be prepared for the possible conditions you may encounter.

Environment

One of the benefits of this vehicle is that it can take you off the beaten path away from most communities. However, you should always respect nature and the rights of others to enjoy it. Do not ride in environmentally sensitive areas. Do not drive over forest crops or shrubs, nor cut down trees or take down fencing, nor spin your wheels and destroy the terrain. "Tread Lightly".

This vehicle can cause OHV wildfires if debris builds up near the exhaust or other engine hot spots and ignites then falls off into dry grass. Avoid riding in wet areas, through muskeg or tall grass, where debris can build up. Should you ride in those areas, inspect and remove all debris from your engine and hot spots. Refer to *Vehicle Care* for details

Chasing wildlife is in many areas illegal. Wildlife can die of exhaustion after being chased by a motorized vehicle. If you encounter animals on the trail, stop and observe quietly and with caution. It will be one of the better memories of your life.

Observe the rule "what you take in, carry out". Do not litter. Do not start campfires unless you have permission to do so, and then only away from dry areas. The hazards you may create on the trail may cause injury to others or yourself, even at a later date.

Respect farm lands. Always obtain the permission of the landowner before riding on private land. Respect crops, farm animals and property lines.

Finally, do not pollute streams, lakes or rivers and do not modify the engine or exhaust system, or remove any of its components as it will alter the vehicle emissions.

Design Limitation

Although the vehicle is exceptionally rugged for its class, it is still a light vehicle by definition and its operation must be restricted to its proper purpose.

The addition of weight to any part of the vehicle changes its gravitational stability and modifies its performance.

Off-Road Operation

The very nature of off-road operation is dangerous. Any terrain, which has not been specially prepared to carry vehicles, presents an inherent danger where terrain substance, shape and steepness are unpredictable. The terrain itself presents a continual element of danger, which must be knowingly accepted by anyone venturing over it.

An operator who takes a vehicle off-road should always exercise the utmost care in selecting the safest path and keeping close watch on the terrain ahead of him. The vehicle should never be operated by anyone who is not completely familiar with the driving instructions applicable to the vehicle, nor should it be operated on steep or treacherous terrain.

Riding Techniques

Information in this guide is limited. Increase your knowledge and improve your skills by following a certified training course.

Care, caution, experience and driving skill are the best precautions against the hazards of vehicle operation.

Respect and follow all posted trail signs. They are there to help you and others.

In off-road operation, power and traction, not speed, are important. Never drive faster than visibility and your own ability to select a safe route permits.

Constantly watch the terrain ahead for sudden changes in slopes or obstacles, such as rocks or stumps, that may cause loss of stability, resulting in tip over or rollover.

It is also wise to know the terrain condition on the other side of a hill or bank. All too often there exists a sharp drop-off that is impossible to negotiate or descend.

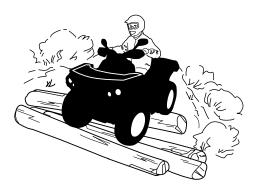
Whenever there is the slightest doubt that the vehicle can safely negotiate an obstacle or a particular piece of terrain, always choose an alternate route

Always use proper riding techniques to avoid vehicle overturns on hills and rough terrain and in turns.

Body Position

To maintain proper control, it is strongly advised that you keep your hands on the handlebar and within easy reach of all controls. The same holds true for your feet on the foot pegs. To minimize the possibility of a leg or foot injury, keep your feet on the foot pegs at all times. Do not direct your toes outwards nor extend your feet out to assist in turning as they can be hit or be snagged on passing obstacles, or may come into contact with the wheels.

Even though there is a suspension on this vehicle, there are "wash-board" or rough terrain conditions that will make you feel uncomfortable and can even cause a back injury. "Posting" or riding in a crouched position will often be required. Slow down and allow your flexed legs to absorb part of the impact energy.



Crossing Roads

If you have to cross a road, ensure to have complete visibility on both sides for incoming traffic and decide on exit point on other side of road. Drive in a straight line toward that point. Do not make sharp direction changes or abrupt accelerations as it may result in a rollover situation. Do not travel on sidewalks or bicycle trails as they are designated specifically for those uses.

Turning

Practice turning at low speeds before attempting to turn at faster speeds.

Keep both hands on handlebars and feet on footpegs.

Maintain a constant speed or a slight acceleration during turn.

To reduce the risk of rollovers:

- Use care when turning.
 - Do not turn the handlebar too far or too fast for your speed and environment. Adjust steering inputs accordingly.
 - Slow down before entering a turn. Avoid hard braking during a turn.
 - Avoid sudden or hard acceleration when turning, even from a stop or low speed.
- Never attempt donuts, skids, slides, fishtails, jumps, or other stunts. If vehicle starts to skid or slide, steer in the direction of the skid or slide. Never slam the brakes and lock the wheels.
- Avoid paved surfaces. This vehicle is not designed to operate on paved surfaces and is more likely to roll over. If you must drive on pavement, turn gradually, go slowly, and avoid abrupt acceleration and braking.

Avoid sudden inputs to steering, throttle or brakes while turning.

A WARNING

Do not attempt turns at excessive speed.



If you do get into a slide or skid, it may help to turn the handlebar in the direction of the skid until you regain control. Never jam the brakes and lock the wheels.

⚠ WARNING

The tires of this vehicle are not suited for paved road use. Also this vehicle is not equipped with a rear differential (rear wheels are always turning at the same speed). For these reasons, pavement may seriously affect the handling and control of the vehicle

Braking

Always keep both hands on handlebars and feet on footpegs when braking.

Practice braking to get familiar with the brake response.

- Do it at low speed first, then increase the speed.
- Practice braking in straight line at different speeds and different braking force.
- Practice emergency braking; optimal braking is obtained in straight line, with high force applied, without locking the wheels.

Remember, braking distance depends on vehicle speed, load and the type of surface. Also, the tires and brakes conditions play a major role.

NOTE:

If going forward the vehicle weight is transferred to the front wheels when braking. To obtain greater stopping efficiency, the brake system distributes more braking force to the front wheels. This will affect vehicle handling and steering control when braking vigorously. Take it into account when braking.

Reverse Operation

When operating in reverse, check that the path behind the vehicle is free of people or obstacles. Proceed slowly and avoid sharp turns.

We recommend sitting on your ATV when operating in reverse. Avoid standing up. Your weight could shift forward against throttle lever, causing an unexpected acceleration.

♠ WARNING

Unexpected acceleration when the ATV is operated in reverse can cause a loss of control.

Obstacles

Obstacles in the "trail" should be traversed with caution. This includes loose rocks, fallen trees, slippery surfaces, fences, posts, and embankments and depressions. You should avoid them whenever possible. Remember that some obstacles are too large or dangerous to cross and should be avoided. Small rocks or fallen trees may be safely crossed approach at a 90° angle. Stand on the footrests while keeping your knees flexed. Adjust speed without losing momentum and do not "gun" the throttle. Hold handlebar firmly. Place body weight rearwards and proceed. Do not try to lift the vehicle front wheels off the ground. Be aware that the object may be slippery or may move while crossing.

Uphill Driving

Before trying to climb a hill, keep these things in mind. Hill Climbing should only be attempted by experienced operators. Start on shallow slopes. Always drive straight uphill and keep your body weight forward towards the top of the hill. Keep your feet on the footrests, shift your ATV into a lower gear and accelerate before you start to climb. Try to keep a steady speed and go easy on the throttle to avoid acceleration. Abrupt slope or terrain variation or rolling one wheel over an obstacle could have a big impact on the stability as it will lift the front of the vehicle increasing the risk of tipping over. Some hills are too steep to safely stop or recover from after an unsuccessful climbing attempt. Try to avoid steep inclines. If you're not careful, you could tip over when going up hills. If the hill is too steep and you cannot proceed or the vehicle begins to roll backwards, apply the brake, being careful not to slide, put the parking brake. Dismount on the left side then use the "K"

turn (while walking back, next to the vehicle on the up hill side and with a hand on the brake lever, slowly back the rear of the vehicle toward the top of the hill then drive downhill). Always walk or dismount on the upside of the slope while keeping clear of the vehicle and its rotating wheels. Do not try to hold on to the vehicle if it begins to topple. Stay clear. Do not ride over the crest of the hill at high speed. Obstacles, including sharp drop-offs, may exist.



Vehicle Behaviors

Due to configuration, this vehicle has excellent climbing ability, so much so that it is possible to tip over before traction is lost. For example, it is common to encounter terrain situations where the top of the hill has eroded to a point that the hill peak rises very sharply. The vehicle can readily negotiate such a condition, however, in doing so, when the front of the vehicle is driven to a point that the vehicle's balance moves rearward, a tip over can occur.

The same situation may apply if an embedded object causes the front of the vehicle to climb more than desired. If such a situation occurs take an alternate route. Be aware of side hilling dangers when doing so. Refer to SIDE HILLING below.

Downhill Driving

Keep your body weight rearwards. Stay seated. Apply the brake gradually to prevent skidding. Do not "coast" down the slope using solely engine compression or in neutral gear.

Decelerating while negotiating a slippery downhill slope could "toboggan" the vehicle. Maintain steady speed and/or accelerate slightly to regain control. Try to avoid steep inclines. If you're not careful, you could tip over when going down hills.



Vehicle Behaviors

This vehicle can climb slopes that are steeper than it can safely descend. Therefore, it is essential to ensure that a safe route exists to descend a slope before you climb it.

Side Hilling

This is one of the **most risky** types of riding since it may drastically change the balance of the vehicle. It should be avoided whenever possible. However, if it is necessary to do so, it is important that you AL-WAYS keep your body weight on the upside of the slope and be prepared to dismount on that side should the vehicle begin to topple.

Avoid all objects or depressions that will intensify the raising of one side of the vehicle higher than the other, thus causing rollover.

A WARNING

Do not try to stop or save the vehicle from damage.

A WARNING

Be careful when loading and transporting liquid reservoirs. They can affect vehicle stability when side hilling by pulling downhill and increasing the risk of a rollover.



Drop-Offs

This vehicle will "bottom out" and usually stop if either the front or rear wheels are driven over a drop-off. If the drop is sharp or deep, the vehicle will nose dive and tip over.

♠ WARNING

Avoid negotiating drop-offs. Reverse and select an alternate route.

Crossing Water

Water can be a unique hazard. If it is too deep the vehicle may "float" and topple. Check the water depth and current before you attempt to cross any water.

Water should not go above the footrest.

Be wary of slippery surfaces such as rocks, grass and logs, both in the water and on its banks. A loss of traction may occur. Do not attempt to enter the water at high speed. The water will act as a brake and could throw you off the vehicle, on the ground.



Wet brakes will affect the braking ability of your vehicle. Make sure you dry the brakes by applying them several times after the vehicle leaves the water, mud or snow. Allow greater distance for braking.

Mud or marsh lands may be encountered near water. Be prepared for sudden "holes" or changes in depth. Similarly, be watchful of hazards such as rocks and logs that are partially covered by vegetation.

Riding on Ice

If your route crosses frozen waterways, make sure the ice is thick enough and sound enough to support the total weight of yourself, the vehicle and its load. Be ever watchful of open water it is a sure indication that the ice thickness will vary.

Ice will also affect the control of the vehicle. Slow down and do not "gun" the throttle. This will only result in spinning of the tires and possible tip over of the vehicle. Avoid rapid braking. This again will possibly result in an uncontrolled slide and tip over of the vehicle. Slush should be avoided at all times since it could block the operation or controls of the vehicle.

Riding on Snow Covered Surfaces

When performing the pre-ride inspection, pay special attention to locations on the vehicle where snow and/or ice accumulations may obstruct visibility of the taillight and reflectors, clog ventilation openings, and interfere with the movement of control levers, switches and brake pedal. Before starting with your ATV check the steering, throttle and brake lever and pedal controls for interference free operation.

Whenever an ATV is ridden on a snow covered drive path the tire grip is generally reduced causing the vehicle to react differently to control inputs from the operator. On low grip surfaces, the steering responses are not as crisp and precise, stopping distances are lengthened and acceleration becomes sluggish. Slow down and do not "gun" the

throttle. This will only result in spinning of the tires and possibly in an over steering slide of the vehicle. Avoid hard braking. This will possibly result in a straight line slide of the vehicle. Again, the best advice is to safely reduce speed in anticipation of a maneuver so to give yourself time and distance to regain total vehicle control before it spins out of your control.

As you drive your ATV over a loose snow covered surface, snow dust will be picked up in the wake turbulence of the moving vehicle and transported to contact and accumulate or melt on some exposed components including rotating parts like brake discs. Water, snow or ice may affect the response time of the brake system of your ATV. Even when not required to reduce vehicle speed apply brakes frequently to prevent ice or snow accumulation and to dry brake pads and discs. While doing so in low risk driving situations you will test for grip level and keep yourself alerted to how the vehicle reacts to your control inputs. Always keep brake pedal, footrests, floor boards, brake and throttle levers free of snow and ice. Frequently wipe snow off seat, hand grips, headlights, taillights and reflectors.

The depth of the snow cover may hide rocks, tree stumps or other objects and if it is wet may totally impede the driveability as the vehicle becomes bogged down or completely looses traction in slushy snow. Look far ahead and always be watchful of any visible clues that might indicate the presence of such obstacles. In doubt steer clear. Avoid driving on any frozen body of water before checking that the ice will safely support the ATV, its riders and its load of cargo. Remember that a given thickness of ice may be sufficient to support a snowmobile but not an ATV of an identical weight because of the smaller load bearing surface of the four tire contact patches as compared to that of a snowmobile track and skis.

To maximize comfort and avoid frostbite, always wear clothing and ATV protective equipment appropriate for the weather conditions you will be exposed to during your ride.

At the end of each ride it is a good practice to clean the vehicle body and all moving components (e.g., brakes, steering components, drivelines and controls) from any snow or ice accumulations. Wet snow will turn to ice during the shut down period and become more difficult to remove at the next pre-ride inspection.

Riding in snow may reduce the brakes stopping capability. Safely reduce speed and allow greater distance for braking. Snow projection may cause ice build up or snow accumulation on brake components and controls. Apply brakes frequently to prevent ice or snow accumulation

Riding on Sand

Riding on sand or sand dunes is another unique experience, but there are some basic precautions that should be observed. Wet, deep or fine sand may create a loss of traction and cause the vehicle to slide, drop off or become "bogged" down. If this occurs look for a firmer base. Again, the best advice is to slow down and be watchful of the conditions.

When riding in sand dunes it is advisable to equip the vehicle with an antenna-type safety flag. This will help make your location more visible to others over the next sand dune. Proceed carefully should you see another safety flag ahead. Since the antenna type safety flag can snag and rebound on your body if caught, do not use it in areas where there are low hanging branches or obstacles.

Riding on Loose Stones

Riding on loose stones or gravel is very similar to riding on ice. They will affect the steering of vehicle possibly causing it to slide or tip over, especially at high speeds (resulting in operator ejection).

Again, the best advice is to slow down and be watchful of the conditions.

In addition, braking distance may be affected. Remember that "gunning" the throttle or sliding may cause loose stones to be ejected rearwards into the path of another rider. Never do it deliberately.

PRIMARY CONTROLS

This section provides basic information on the functions of the various controls of your vehicle. For more details on how to operate a control in conjunction with others, refer to *Operating Instructions*.

Throttle Lever

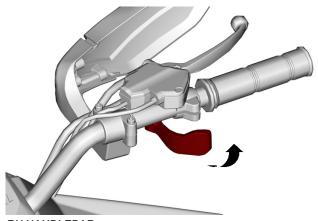
The throttle lever is located on the RH side of the handlebar.

When pushed forward, it increases engine speed and allows engagement of the transmission.

When it is released, the engine speed should automatically return to idle and the vehicle should gradually slow down.

NOTE:

The engine idle speed is preset at the factory. If the idle speed is not satisfactory, consult an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer for adjustment.



RH HANDLEBAR

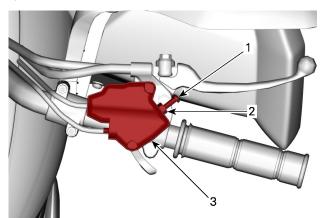
The vehicle is also equipped with a throttle release switch. If the throttle should freeze or stick in the open position when released, the throttle release switch will limit the engine speed to idle speed.

⚠ WARNING

Check throttle lever operation before you start the engine. If the throttle lever does not function smoothly, check for the cause. Correct the problem before riding the vehicle. Consult an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer if you cannot find or solve the problem yourself.

Speed Limiter

This vehicle is equipped with an adjustable speed limiter screw on the throttle lever housing. The speed limiter prevents the throttle from being fully opened, even when the throttle lever is pushed fully forward. This limits the available engine power and, therefore, vehicle speed.

⚠ WARNING

Adults should always limit the maximum restricted speed within the ability and capacity of the child to operate the vehicle safely. Never allow the child to adjust the speed limiter screw.

PRIMARY CONTROLS

BRP recommends that all beginners start off with the speed limiter screw turned in while they learn.

Adults can gradually adjust the speed limiter screw to increase the maximum speed as the beginner becomes more familiar with the operation of the vehicle. Refer to the following table.

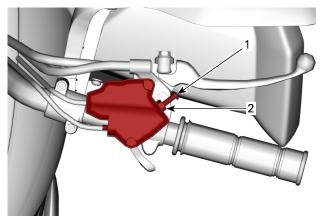

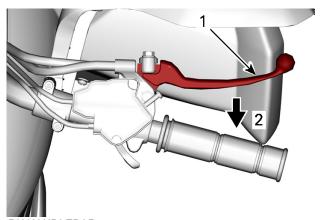

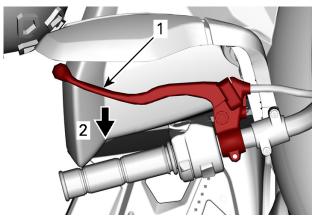
LH Brake Lever

Parking Brake

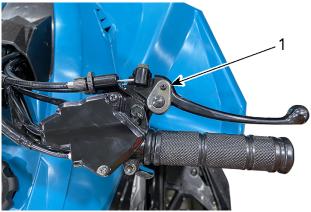

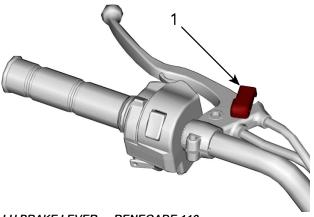

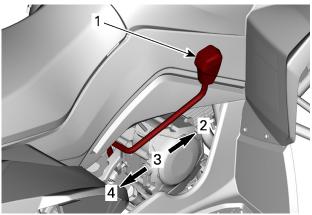
SECONDARY CONTROLS

Transmission Lever

A three-position transmission lever is located on the RH side of the vehicle, near the engine.

NOTICE

Always stop the vehicle completely and apply the brakes prior to moving the transmission lever. Make sure the engine is at idle.

To change the transmission position, completely stop the vehicle, apply the brakes, then move the lever to the desired position. Do not force the lever.

⚠ WARNING

If you experience shifting problems, consult an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer or other qualified person for adjustment of the shift linkage.

F. Forward

This is the normal driving gear. It allows the vehicle to reach its maximum speed.

N: Neutral

This position disengages the transmission to allow manual vehicle movement or towing.

R. Reverse

This allows the vehicle to go backwards.

A WARNING

Before operating the vehicle in reverse, ensure the path behind is clear of obstacles or bystanders. BRP recommends that you remain seated. Avoid standing up. Your weight could shift forward against the throttle lever causing an unexpected acceleration and loss of control.

Multifunction Switch

The multifunction switch is located on the LH side of the handlebar.

The controls located on the multifunction switch are the following:

Emergency Engine Stop Switch

The emergency engine stop switch can be used to stop the engine quickly, or as an emergency control. When this switch is in the STOP position, there is no electrical power to the vehicle and the engine cannot run.

To stop the engine, fully release the throttle lever then set the emergency engine stop switch to the STOP position. Then turn the ignition to the OFF position

NOTE:

Although the engine can be stopped by turning the ignition key to the OFF position, we recommend that the engine be stopped by setting the emergency engine stop switch to the STOP position.

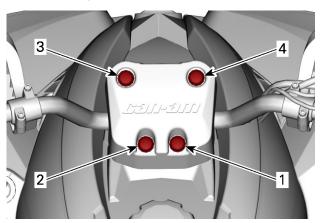

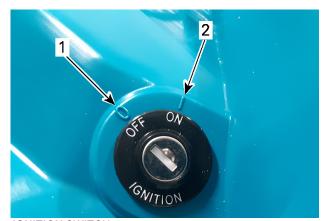

Ignition Switch

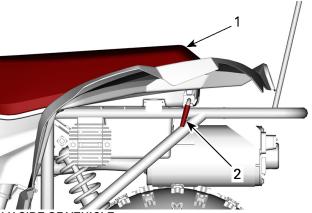

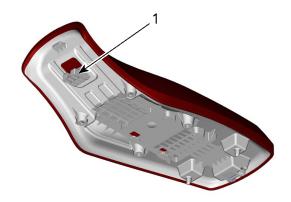


LH SIDE OF VEHICLE

- 2 Seat latch

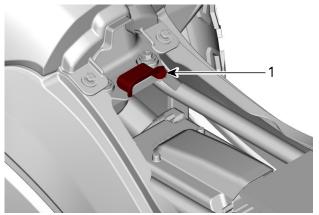

FUEL

Fuel Requirements

NOTICE

Always use fresh gasoline. Gasoline will oxidize; the result is a loss of octane, volatile compounds, and the production of gum and varnish deposits which can damage the fuel system.

Alcohol fuel blending varies by country and region. This engine was designed to operate using the recommended fuels. However, be aware of the following:

- Use of fuel containing alcohol above the percentage specified by government regulations is not recommended and can result in the following problems in the fuel system components:
 - Starting and operating difficulties.
 - Deterioration of rubber or plastic parts.
 - Corrosion of metal parts.
 - Damage to internal engine parts.
- Inspect frequently for the presence of fuel leaks or other fuel system abnormalities if you suspect the presence of alcohol in gasoline exceeds the current government regulations.
- Alcohol-blended fuels attract and hold moisture, which may lead to fuel phase separation and can result in engine performance problems or engine damage.

Recommended Fuel

Use regular unleaded gasoline with a minimum AKI (RON+MON)/2 octane rating of 87, or a RON octane rating of 92.

Use unleaded gasoline containing a MAXIMUM of 10% ethanol.



NOTICE

Never experiment with other fuels. Engine or fuel system damage may occur with the use of an inadequate fuel.

NOTICE

Do NOT use fuel from fuel pumps labeled E85.

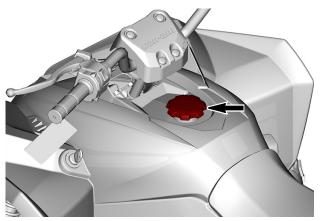

Fueling Procedure

 - Fuel vapors are flammable and explosive under certain conditions.
- Never use an open flame to check the fuel level.
- Never smoke or allow a flame or spark in the vicinity.
- Always work in a well-ventilated area.
- Never top off the fuel tank before placing the vehicle in a warm area. As the temperature increases, fuel expands and may overflow.
- Always wipe off any fuel or oil spillage from the vehicle.
- If fuel spills on your skin or clothing, immediately wash it off with soap and water and change your clothing.
- 1. Stop the engine.
- 2. Do not allow anyone to remain seated on the vehicle while fueling.
- 3. Unscrew the fuel tank cap counterclockwise to remove it.

- 4. Insert the spout into the filler neck.
- Pour the fuel slowly, allowing time for the air in the tank to escape and preventing back flow. Be careful not to spill fuel.
 Stop pouring when the fuel level reaches the bottom of the filler neck. Do not overfill. Do not fill the tank neck.
 Fully tighten the fuel tank cap (clockwise).

BREAK-IN PERIOD

Operating During Break-In

A break-in period of 10 operating hours is required before running the vehicle at sustained full throttle.

After the break-in period, the vehicle should be inspected by an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer, repair shop or person of your own choosing. Refer to *Maintenance*.

Engine

During the break-in period:

- Avoid full throttle operation.
- Maximum throttle should not exceed 3/4.
- Avoid sustained accelerations.
- Avoid prolonged cruising speeds.
- Avoid engine overheating.

However, brief accelerations and speed variations contribute to a good break-in.

Brakes

A WARNING

The new brakes will not perform to their maximum efficiency until their burnishing is completed. To achieve a good burnishing, bring the vehicle to a complete stop for a minimum of 50 times using brakes. Readjust brakes if needed, refer to Mechanical Brakes.

Drive Belt

A new belt requires a break-in period of 50 km (30 mi).

During the break-in period:

- Avoid strong accelerations and decelerations
- Avoid pulling a load
- Avoid high speed cruising.

OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS

Starting the Engine

⚠ WARNING

Always proceed with the pre-ride inspection prior to operating the vehicle. Always check for proper operation of critical controls, safety features and mechanical components before starting.

NOTICE

Do not operate the vehicle immediately after starting. Allow the engine to run for several minutes before operating. This will avoid damage to the engine.

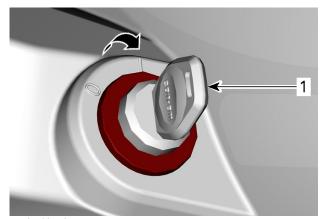

Adjusting the Suspension

A WARNING

Suspension adjustment could affect vehicle handling. Always take time to familiarize yourself with the vehicle's behavior after any suspension adjustment has been made.

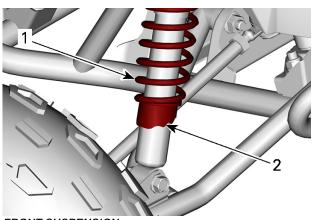
⚠ WARNING

Left and right front shock adjustment must always be set to the same position. Never adjust one shock only. Uneven adjustment can cause poor handling and loss of stability, which could lead to an accident. Follow the adjustment procedure carefully, or consult your Can-Am Off-road dealer for service.

Spring Preload Adjustment

- 1. Shorten the springs for a firmer ride and rough road conditions.
- 2. Lengthen the springs for a softer ride and smooth road conditions.
- Adjust the spring preload by turning the adjustment cam or ring accordingly.

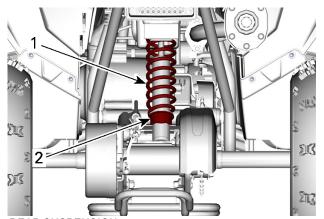

VEHICLE TRANSPORTATION

When transporting this vehicle, secure it to a trailer using suitable tiedown straps. The use of ordinary ropes is not recommended.

A WARNING

Do not tow this vehicle behind a car or other vehicle. Always use a trailer. Never tip this vehicle on end for transporting. The vehicle must be in its normal operating position (on all four wheels), facing toward the front of the transporting vehicle.



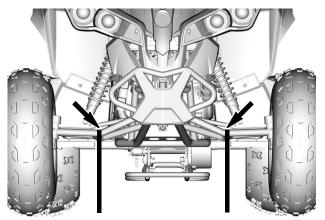

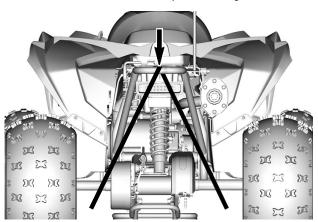

MAINTENANCE

MAINTENANCE SCHEDULE

Maintenance is very important for keeping your vehicle in safe operating condition. The vehicle should be serviced as per maintenance schedule.

The maintenance schedule does not exempt the pre-ride inspection.

WARNING

Failure to properly maintain the vehicle according to the maintenance schedule and procedures can make it unsafe to operate.

EPA Regulation - Canadian and USA Vehicles

A repair shop or person of the owner's choosing may maintain, replace, or repair emission control devices and systems. These instructions do not require components or service by BRP or authorized Can-Am Off-road dealers.

Although an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer has an in-depth technical knowledge and tools to service your vehicle, the emission-related warranty is not conditioned on the use of an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer or any other establishment with which BRP has a commercial relationship.

Proper maintenance is the owner's responsibility. A warranty claim may be denied if, among other things, the owner or operator caused the problem through improper maintenance or use.

For emission-related warranty claims, BRP is limiting the diagnosis and repair of emission-related parts to the authorized Can-Am Off-road dealers. For more information, please refer to the *US EPA Emission-Related Warranty* contained in the *Warranty* section.

You must follow the instructions for fuel requirements in the fueling section of this manual. Even if gasoline containing greater than ten volume percent ethanol is readily available, the US EPA issued a prohibition against the use of gasoline containing greater than 10 vol% ethanol that applies to this vehicle. The use of gasoline containing greater than 10 vol% ethanol with this engine may harm the emission control system.

Severe Duty Conditions

If your vehicle is used in the following conditions, refer to the SEVERE DUTY table of the maintenance chart:

- Repeated hauling loads at more than 75% the maximum capacity.
 - The increased workload applied to the drive system accelerates the differential, gearbox / transmission, and engine oil life. This

reduces internal component longevity if not replaced more frequently.

Driving at excessive speeds for a prolonged amount of time.

Higher than average utility / commercial use requires more frequent fluid / wear component replacement than regular trail, recreational, or occasional utility purposes.

Air Filter Maintenance Guideline

Air filter maintenance should be adjusted according to riding conditions.

Air filter maintenance must be increased in frequency in the following dusty conditions:

- Riding on dry sand
- Riding on dry dirt covered surfaces
- Riding on snow covered surfaces
- Riding on dry gravel roads or similar conditions.

Riding in a group under these conditions increases the frequency of the air filter maintenance.

Maintenance Schedule

Ensure that proper maintenance is performed at the recommended intervals, as indicated in the table. Individual maintenance tasks are identified as follows:

A WARNING

Turn off the engine and follow these maintenance procedures when performing maintenance. If you do not follow proper maintenance procedures you can be injured by hot parts, moving parts, electricity, chemicals or other hazards.

⚠ WARNING

Should removal of a locking device be required (e.g. lock tab, self-locking fastener, etc.), always replace it with a new one.

Engine Oil

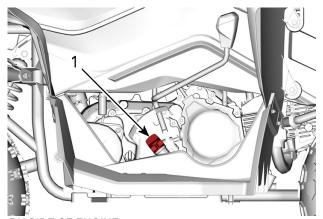

Check the oil level frequently and adjust as necessary. Do not overfill. Operating the vehicle with an improper oil level may severely damage engine. Wipe off any spillage.

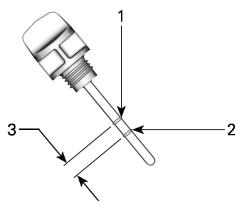
While checking the oil level, visually inspect the engine area for leaks.

Recommended Engine Oil

Your ATV's engine was validated using XPS™ oil.

BRP recommends the use of its XPS engine oil or an equivalent at all times.

Damage caused by the use of an oil not suitable for the engine may not be covered by the BRP Limited Warranty.

XPS Recommended Engine Oil

General purpose: XPS 10W50 synthetic oil Cold temperature: XPS 0W40 Synthetic oil

If the Recommended XPS Engine Oil Is Not Available

Use a 4-stroke SAE 10W50 engine oil that meets or exceeds the following lubricant industry specifications.

Always check the API service label certification on the oil container. It must contain the indicated standards

API service classification SN and JASO MA2

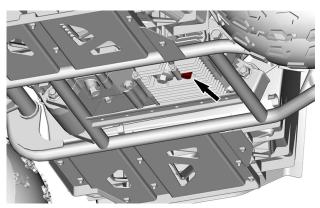
Changing the Engine Oil

The oil change should be carried out on a warm engine.

A CAUTION

Engine oil can be very hot. In order to avoid potential burns, do not remove the engine drain plug if the engine is hot. Wait until the engine oil is warm.

- 1. Place the vehicle on a level surface. Apply the parking brake.
- 2. Clean the engine drain plug area.
- 3. Start the engine and let it idle for 2–3 minutes. Stop the engine.
- 4. Place a drain pan under the drain plug area.
- 5. Unscrew the drain plug.

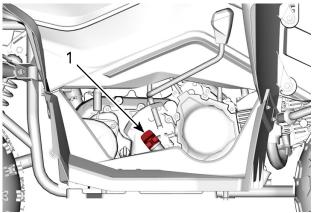

- 11. Clean the sealing surface on the engine. Make sure it is free from burrs.
- 12. Reinstall the drain plug.

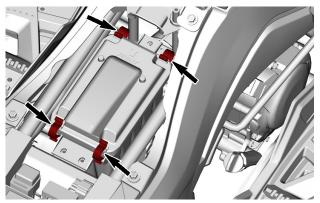

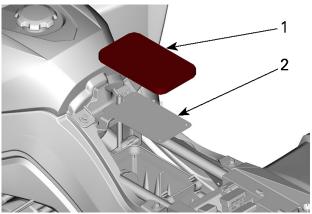

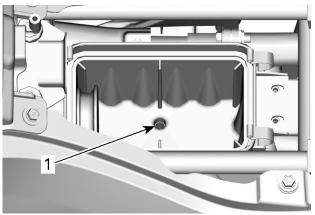
Cleaning and Lubricating the Air Filter

Engine performance degradation or severe damage can occur if the air filter is not properly maintained and/or replaced.

- 2. Apply a commercially available lubricant to the filter.
- Remove any oil or debris from the air filter housing and the sediment drain.

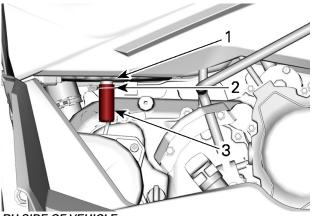
Draining the Air Filter Housing

 Periodically inspect the air filter housing drain tube for liquids or deposits.

NOTICE

If the vehicle is operated in wet conditions or for extended periods at high throttle settings, inspect the drain tube more frequently than is specified in *Maintenance Schedule*.

If liquids or deposits are found, squeeze and remove the hose clamp. Remove the drain tube plug and empty it.

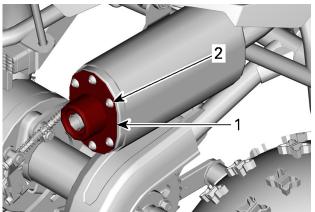

The muffler must be periodically purged of accumulated carbon.

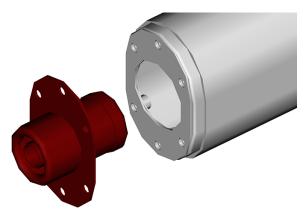

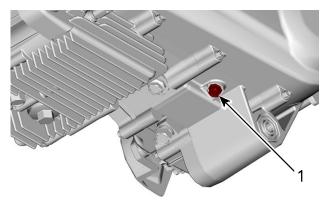

Salt water will corrode metal components. If you operate the vehicle near salt water, rinse it frequently with fresh water.

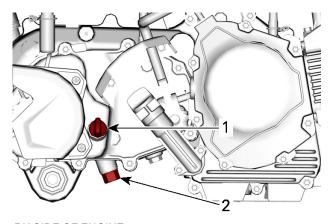
Verifying the Gearbox Oil Level

To ensure that the level is correct, oil should be visible at the bottom of the fill plug hole threads. The fill plug is located on the side of the gearbox, on the right side of the vehicle.

Throttle Cable

Inspecting the Throttle Cable

 Inspect throttle cable for excessive wear, kinking or fraying. Ensure that the cable moves freely.

NOTICE

The throttle cable must be replaced if any signs of wear, fraying or other damages are found.

Lubricating the Throttle Cable

1. Lubricate the throttle cable using a silicone-based cable lubricant.

♠ WARNING

Always use a silicone-based lubricant. Using another lubricant (such as a water-based lubricant) could cause the cable(s) to stick or become stiff.

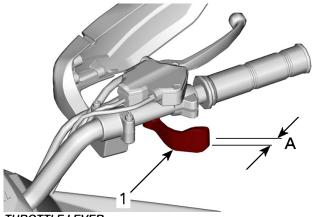

Battery

Battery Location

The battery is located under the seat.

Battery Maintenance



Never charge a battery while it is installed in the vehicle.

NOTICE

Never remove the battery sealing cap.

These vehicles are equipped with a VRLA battery (Valve Regulated Lead Acid). It is a maintenance-free type battery, and there is no need to add water to adjust the electrolyte level.

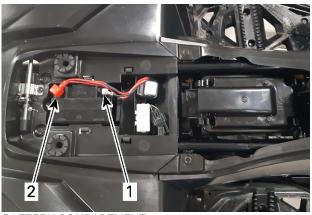

- Remove corrosion from battery cable terminals and battery posts using a firm wire brush. Battery top should be cleaned using a soft brush and any grease-cutting soap or baking soda solution.
- Apply dielectric grease or an equivalent on battery posts to protect against oxidation.

Installing the Battery

The installation is the reverse of the removal procedure.

NOTICE

Always reconnect RED (+) cable first, then the BLACK (-) cable.

Fuse

The fuse box is located under the seat.

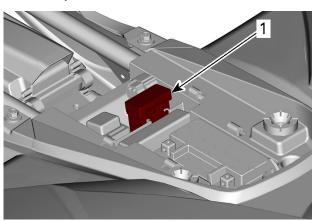

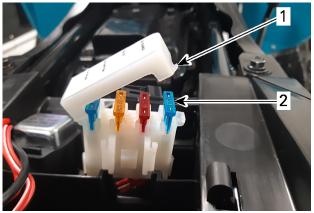

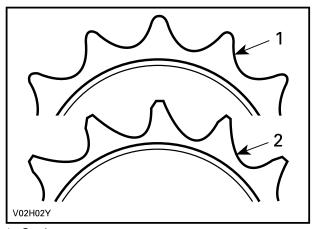

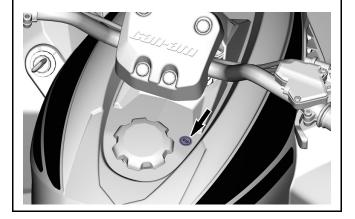




Percentage of Ethanol

Troubleshooting

ENGINE DOES NOT CRANK

IGNITION SWITCH IS IN THE OFF POSITION.

Place switch to the ON position.

BURNT FUSE.

- Check main supply fuse.

WEAK BATTERY OR LOOSE CONNECTIONS.

- Check connections and condition of terminals.
- Have the battery checked.
- Contact an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer.

2. ENGINE TURNS OVER BUT FAILS TO START

EMERGENCY ENGINE STOP SWITCH IS IN THE OFF POSITION.

Set switch to the ON position.

FLOODED ENGINE (SPARK PLUG WET WHEN REMOVED).

- When the engine does not start after several attempts, the engine may be flooded with fuel. Proceed as follows:
 - Turn ignition switch to ON and ensure choke is not applied.
 - Fully depress throttle lever and hold while starting the engine.
 - As soon as the engine starts, release throttle lever. Do not race engine.

If the engine still does not start:

- Disconnect the spark plug cable.
- Remove the spark plug.
- Crank engine several times.
- Install new spark plug if possible or clean and dry removed spark plug.
 - Start engine as explained above. If engine continues to flood, seek service from an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer, repair shop, or person of your own choosing for maintenance, repair, or replacement. Please refer to the US EPA Emissions-Related Warranty contained herein for information about warranty claims.
- Ensure there is no fuel in the engine oil due to engine flooding, if so, replace engine oil.

NO FUEL TO THE ENGINE (SPARK PLUG DRY WHEN REMOVED).

 Seek service from an authorized Can-Am dealer, repair shop, or person of your own choosing for maintenance, repair, or replacement. Please refer to the US EPA Emissions-Related Warranty contained herein for information about warranty claims.

SPARK PLUG/IGNITION (NO SPARK).

- Remove spark plug from engine and reconnect it to spark plug cap.
- Ensure the ignition switch is set to ON, and the emergency engine stop switch is set to the RUN position.
- Start engine with spark plug grounded to the engine away from spark plug hole. If no spark appears, replace spark plug.
- If trouble persists, seek service from an authorized Can-Am dealer, repair shop, or person of your own choosing for maintenance, repair, or replacement. Please refer to the US EPA Emissions-Related Warranty contained herein for information about warranty claims.

3. ENGINE LACKS ACCELERATION OR POWER

FOULED/DAMAGE/WORN SPARK PLUG.

Clean/verify spark plug and heat range. Replace as required.

LACK OF FUEL TO ENGINE.

Check items listed in Engine Turns Over But Fails To Start.

ENGINE IS OVERHEATING.

- If the engine tends to overheat, try the following:
 - Reduce vehicle speed but maintain sufficient speed to supply cooling air to the engine. If engine is still overheating after approximately one minute, stop vehicle.
 - Apply parking brake and stop engine.
 - Let engine cool down.
 - See an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer as soon as possible.
- If overheating persists, contact an authorized Can-Am Off-road dealer.

AIR FILTER/BOX CLOGGED OR DIRTY.

All parts replaced under this limited warranty become the property of BRP.

- Designed, built, and equipped so as to conform, at the time of sale, with all applicable laws, rules and regulations; and
- Free from defects in materials and workmanship that may cause the failure of a warranted part. All replacement parts must be identical in all material respects to that part as described in BRP's Executive Order of Certification application.

The warranty on emissions-related parts function as follows:

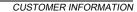
